The CARE Academy Carnival marked the joyous culmination of the school year, bringing together students, families, and staff for an afternoon of festivities. Laughter filled the air as attendees enjoyed games, activities, and celebrating a year of growth, learning, and community bonds.

We worked to advance the common good by uniting citizens nationwide for impactful volunteerism. With a focus on mental health and nature, over 200 volunteers enhanced John H Dover Park, fostered community and positive change.

The CARE Academy's final summer journey, a memorable fishing trip, cast a perfect finale to the summer session. The students caught fish, learned about camp site safety, played yard games, and kayaked, thanks to Cabella's.

At the beginning of the school year, in partnership with Education Foundation for Billings Public Schools, our community united in a collective effort, gathering school supplies to ensure every student's success as well as support teachers in the classroom.

The CommUnity Rally is our largest event of the year that celebrates our volunteers and kicks off the community giving campaign. We enjoyed music from El Wencho, yard games, and food to truly ignite a wave of positive change.

Our Socktoberfest Sock Drive witnessed an overwhelming display of generosity, with over 20 organizations and individuals joining forces to donate a total of 3,184 pairs of socks, a contribution that truly warmed the hearts and soles of those in need.
